







Introducing the Wuxia Film:
The "Warrior" Behind the Silver Screen

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- Xia type of male/female warrior figure found in the Warring States Period (403-221 BC)
 - "errant knights"
 - Historical tradition of sword-bearing warrior figures going from one state to another offering services
 - Comparable to ronin in Japanese historical tradition
- Known to take justice into own hands
 - No hesitation to use force
 - Disregard for the law
- Differing opinions on social origins as well as overall views of the xia



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Introducing the Wuxia Film: History of the Genre

- Wuxia: Initially a literary genre
 - Originated in the Tang Dynasty (618-907)
 - Modern wuxia novels emerged post-1919
- Film genre developed out of "period costume" films – more drama-based
 - First recognized wuxia film in 1928
- 1930s: Wuxia films as "Negative Influence"
 - Government ban until 1980s
 - Moved to Hong Kong
- 1940s: Kungfu film genre in Hong Kong

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- 1950s & 1960s: Hong Kong Cinema "Boom"
 - Renewed interest in wuxia films due to popularity of new wuxia novels
 - "New school" wuxia films
 - Start to emphasize more complex characters, more realistic violence,
 - More modeled after kungfu films
- 1970s: Rise of Bruce Lee
 - Jackie Chan & Yuen Woo-Ping [Yuan Huo-Pin]

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Defining the Wuxia Film: Plot/Themes

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Zu: Warriors from the Magic Mountain (Tsui Hark [Xu Ke], 1983)

- Often a glorification of the past
 - Integrating modern ideas/concepts
- Complete mythical/fantastical version of Ancient China
 - jianghu lit. "rivers and lakes"
 - Element of fantasy/supernatural powers
- Wuxia "heroes" often act as agents of history
 - Can involve more personal plots/themes such as revenge
- Conflict resolved through use of force

Defining the Wuxia Film: Characterization

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Golden Swallow (Chang Cheh [Zhang Che], 1968)

- Often represented as outlaws
 - Non-conformists who fight for justice
- Value on individualism
 - Disregard for authority/tradition
 - Symbol of personal freedom
- Presence of the Female Warrior
