# Why would I want to take this class?

For lots of reasons! The main point in this class is to get you interested in the humanities more generally. You might be interested in learning more about digital humanities and how those who study the humanities are starting to use digital and scientific tools to aid their work. Plus, you might be interested in developing your own research skills. We'll also be

discussing museums, and working together to work together in a debate discussing the humanities and the ways that the world can be helped by using the humanities!

Of course, this class is only for five weeks and there's only so much we can cover in that time period! So this course isn't designed to give you an in-depth dive into any one particular area, but I've designed it as best I can to support you in developing new interests!

I do make a promise to you, though: it's likely that you're going to learn things and do things in this class you haven't had a chance to do in school just yet, and it's likely you'll do some stuff that you already do and can do with your eyes closed. The point of this class is to introduce you to a great new topic while also giving you a chance to learn in a way that isn't like a normal high school setup. I'm not a teacher, I don't pretend to be, and while some parts of class may look like a lecture, this is a discussion-based class! Come with questions, and I'll do my best to answer!

## Assignments and Requirements

All readings for this class will be optional, and they'll be available to you digitally. I won't be asking you to pay for anything for this class yourself, and I'll make sure anything you do need specifically for this class is covered for you. Since HSSP is being taught virtually this year, any supplies you require for the course will be either virtual, free to download to your devices or I will ask ESP to ship them to your home. I do strongly recommend you bring a notebook and a pen for taking notes. I'm also happy for you to take notes on your own computer or iPad or something similar, if you work better that way.

**Recordings of this class, whether Zoom recordings or using any other means, are not allowed.** This is to protect my privacy, yours and that of your fellow students. I'll make any slides or resources we use in class available online for you to catch up if you miss a session, wherever I can. You don't have to worry about missing a class! It'll always be easy to jump right back in wherever you can.

Part of this class will involve a final debate involving each of you in our last class session together. We'll talk more about this in class, and the presentation itself should last no longer than 5 minutes. I plan to be able to give you time to work on your presentation in our class time. I'm always happy to work with you all to support any research you wish to do for your projects. If you have any concerns or questions about the presentation, always reach out to me, and we'll talk about it!
